Fried Ice Cream is about the dreamer who doesn't have it easy.

Vividly and boldly reflective of the soul of the <u>AUC</u>. Unapologetically reflective of the perils of inner-city life while highlighting the beautiful and often raw nuances of coming-of-age young, black and carefree.

Offering another perspective of narratively and visually composing stories, *Fried Ice Cream* captures Atlanta, the city, as muse and setting under the feminine gaze.





Set during the summer of their sophomore year in college, *Fried Ice Cream* explores

Akeebah and Sloan's West End world: the **restlessness** of intolerably hot summers, the ever-present **hustle** of wanting more, and the medley of **eccentric characters** within it.

Warm, humid and gloriously alive, their world vividly captures nuances of **black femininity** and sisterhood.

Each episode in the series will begin with a flashback of the summer's annual kick off party.

Through the series, we'll see how this one **pivolal night** sets off a chain of reactions for the series events: Akeebah gets her job, she finds out her boyfriend is cheating on her, and Sloan realizes that she and Akeebah are growing apart.



Sloan Radcliff

19 year old college student, "young Black Diane Keaton" in a muted palette with accessorizing pops of color – soft vintage tomboy

Studying mass communication and hoping to one day be a journalist, she's perceived as cold and always direct.

An "old-soul" who quietly observes, takes in her surroundings, Sloan has always had to have her own back and forge her own way. A natural knack for writing, Sloan often writes about her surroundings and people out of quirk.









Latisha

Akeebah's mother, "Tootie" by loved ones, deceased

Died of health complications when Akeebah was five. Never married, she had Akeebah with a local street fella and high school sweetheart who met an early demise - wrong place, wrong time. Melvin's only younger sister and known for her baking, she always called on her brother when she was in a financial pinch. Akeebah was her pride and joy and she trusted Melvin and Liola unequivocable to raise her daughter.



Sloan's Family

Beatrice "Bea" Radcliff

Sloan's mother / mid 30s, lifelong alcoholic and gambler, housecleaner

Plagued by a constant need for validation by men, Beatrice is the neighborhood functioning wino who has more debt than coins. Outwardly "the life of the party", she and Sloan live in the house she was kicked out of when she became pregnant by an older married man.

Unlike the controlling grip of her own mother, Beatrice's mothering is expressed through emotional detachment and weaponizing silence against Sloan. She provides shelter, food and thrifted clothing, raising Sloan as a latchkey kid and inadvertently shaping her to become self-reliant.

Her resentment of Sloan turns to jealousy as her daughter passes every milestones she never reached, resulting in their roles often swapping in terms of responsibility/"parenting" and Beatrice feeling inadequate as a mother and a woman.

Bry

10 year old resident smart aleck and jokester

Full of black boy joy and a touch of knucklehead, Bry is the neighborhood kid that everyone watches out for and is simultaneously annoyed by.

He's inquisitive and curious, West End is his playground and he gives gentrifiers hell. A colorful kid who speaks his mind, he has a lot of big dreams that are expressed frequently and hilariously (i.e he has dreams of becoming an architect once he discovers that's the term for people who "draw" buildings and some days he wants to be "The Sock Man" - a neighborhood man who sells socks out of his trunk.)

The younger cousin of Peetie, he's not unfamiliar with seedy behavior and trying to hang with the "Lion's Den" despite their dismissal of him.

Tula Mobley

22 year old college student, epitome of men's street wear, he's aware you're following him on Instagram

Never trust pearly whites and a fresh haircut. Tall, dark and handsome, he's a local playboy and one day will be the heir to his family's funeral home in West End. He's flashy but it's "tasteful". Not gaudy but he accessories just enough to let you know he got it.

Junior athlete in college, he's charming and knows he's the shit. He's the stuff that Warsan Shire poems are made of. His sophomore year, Akeebah's freshman, he thought it would be best if she got an abortion.

60 year old junkyard salesman, chronic chainsmoker, velour track-suit wearer, he's always color coordinated and shit-talking

He'll sell you a lemon-hold-the-ade and sand for the beach - but the truth is Mr. Rube hasn't been doing too good. The hood is changing and so are the times. His once glorious junkyard, Mr. Rube's Emporium of Thangs, is now being considered a residential eyesore and his seemingly invaluable business has online competition. He eventually needs the girls to help him sell his shit.

Lion's Den

Peetie: 22 years old, neighborhood "plug" and small time dope boy.

He leads the "Lion's Den". Known for throwing the best summer parties and selling the best local bud. He's cousin to the neighborhood "Dennis the Menace" - Bry. Charismatic, with southern flair, the men want to be him and the ladies want to wear his gold chain.

Cassius: 22 years old, Peetie's right hand.

Peetie's right-hand-man and member of the Lion's Den, he's a quintessential West End dude. Best known for his "roasting sessions", and being dope boy fresh, he's reminiscent of <u>D.C. Young Fly</u> - never having a dull moment.

Riley "Phat": 22 year old self-proclaimed "big boi" and he's got the fluffy to back it up.

Local gambler and ticket scalper known for being able to get anyone in to any event. A neighborhood favorite amongst the kids and mommas, gifting back-to-school supplies every school year, turkeys every Thanksgiving and playing Santa each Christmas.

Lion's Den

Neal: 19 year old, Mr. Pete's nephew and reluctant employee




